


Structure of Health Districts and Division of Public Health

- The 7 Health Districts are each a separate, autonomous agency
- Health Districts are not "regional offices" of DHW
- The Food Protection Program delegates authority to Health Districts to conduct inspections, issue licenses, investigate complaints, etc
- State Food Protection Program consists of:
 - Program Manager (Full Time)
 - Administrative Assistant (Half Time)






- funding of their health

- Districts are the "feet on the ground" for Food Safety

Preventing Bacterial Growth in Foods

- Plan transition to more accurate terminology: Potentially Hazardous Foods (PHF) to Time/Temperature Control for Safety Foods (TCS)
- These are foods that are known to support rapid and progressive growth of harmful bacteria when certain conditions are met
- Examples:
 - Meats (raw and cooked) and items that contain meat protein
 - Cooked starches like rice and pasta
 - All cooked produce
 - Some raw produce (seed sprouts, cut melons, cut tomatoes, cut leafy greens)



What are non-TCS foods?

- Typical examples:
 - Breads
 - Cakes and most pastries
 - Cookies
 - Fruit jams and jellies
 - Honey
 - Candy
 - Fruit pies
 - Dried fruits
 - Dry herbs, seasonings
 - Dry cereals, trail mixes, granola
 - Nuts
 - Vinegar and flavored vinegar
 - Popcorn, popcorn balls, cotton candy



Current Practice in Idaho

- Non-TCS foods sold directly to a consumer are not regulated by Idaho Food Code
- 2015 Legislative Session HB187
- Opinion of Deputy Attorney General
 - March 26, 2015 opinion: "Neither the Idaho Code, IDAPA, nor the Idaho Food Code define the term 'cottage foods.' Consequently, to determine whether the sale of such foods are prohibited, it is necessary to determine specifically which foods are considered 'cottage foods' and the context of their sale. Generally, if direct-toconsumer sale of a food product is not regulated by the Food Code then such sales are not prohibited."

Where do we go from here?

- Maintain current practice
 - Improve training available to Health Districts for consistency purposes
- Promulgate rules
 - Idaho Food Code is currently being updated is a clear definition in the Food Code desired?
- Further define in statute
 - Will require future work in upcoming Legislative sessions
