



# Juvenile Justice Substance Use Disorder Services

*"Delivering Locally Managed Care with System-wide Accountability"*

## IDJC System Goals

### Locally driven process

- Support districts in development of quality systems with locally driven decision making

### Accountability with funding

- Monitor expenditures and approve payment only for services authorized by the local teams

### Reliability of services

- Manage populations to ensure uninterrupted services

### Evaluate results to ensure best use of state funds

- Focus on comprehensive and accurate data collection to enhance system evaluation

**Legislative Appropriation** The Idaho Legislature appropriated \$4,032,000 to IDJC for juvenile justice substance use disorder community-based treatment for juveniles served at the county level (not in IDJC custody).

**Partnership with Counties** IDJC engaged county partners to develop local systems of authorization and monitoring of juveniles in treatment. Over 90% of justice-involved juveniles are managed by county probation officers.


**District Collaboration** Each District created teams to develop a plan for authorization and monitoring of services, and population and budget management at the local level. The plans utilize a standard client intake packet for each juvenile in treatment as well as standard assessment tools to ensure statewide consistency in service delivery.

**System-wide Standards** IDJC established a set of standards for the new JJ system to guide the development of district plans. Communication and planning with judges is essential; Qualified providers must meet IDHW licensing and certification rules; Standard intake, assessment and data collection are requirements; Administrative costs must be minimal and not duplicated in the system; District wide collaboration will ensure all juveniles' needs are met including those in the rural areas; On-going partnerships with Behavioral Health Cooperative Members will result in a strong state substance use disorder system.

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## Key Components of System-wide Accountability

The standard intake packet for each juvenile in the treatment system and an electronic reporting system to allow immediate communication of intake, authorization and discharge decisions will allow IDJC to ensure accountability for their county partners. The data captured from this intake packet enhances evaluation on juveniles in the treatment system and ensures the effectiveness of the investment of state funds in SUD treatment.



## First Steps to Local Accountability

A list of 1,235 Juveniles with billed services in 4Q of FY2011 was provided to IDJC and sent to counties; careful review and audit eliminated over 600 inactive clients from the list; the new list of clients will be managed at the local and state level to ensure all payments are for juveniles actively participating in treatment and in compliance with court-ordered probation terms.

**Evaluation** IDJC and county partners will capture all data on the juveniles in treatment to allow system-wide evaluation. Integrating treatment data with information available in IDJC data systems will provide critical outcomes related to length of stay in treatment, successful completion, criminogenic risk, commitment trends and recidivism.


