ATR 4 Overview

- SAMHSA grant to provide Substance Use Disorder (SUD) services to specific populations. Idaho is one of only six applicants to receive this grant
- Focus on a client-centered approach and client choice in treatment services and planning
- ATR 4 and all grant funded services will expire September 29, 2017

Business Psychology Associates (BPA)

Private entity contracted by the State of Idaho to manage the Treatment and Recovery Support Services network

- o Process referrals and screen clients for eligibility
- o Conduct client intakes
- o Authorize services and pay claims
- o Utilization management of client services
- o Quality assurance activities including provider audits

Eligibility

Financial Eligibility for ATR 4

- o Less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Rate in the past 30 days
 - o Financial screening completed by BPA

Clinical Eligibility for ATR 4

- o Global Appraisal of Individual Needs (GAIN) assessment conducted by a Qualified Substance Use Disorder Professional (QSUDP)

Eligibility, cont.

Priority Population Eligibility for ATR 4

- o Veterans with SUD who have committed a crime and are on supervised probation or parole
- o Child Welfare families with SUD and involvement in Child Welfare Court
- o Homeless individuals and families – Meets the ATR 4 definition of homelessness in the past 30 days

Referral Sources

ATR - Veterans

- o Veteran Court Coordinator, Felony Parole/Probation Officer, or a Misdemeanant Probation Officer will refer clients to BPA

ATR - Child Welfare

- o CPS Liaisons or a Child Protection Drug Court Coordinator will refer clients to BPA

ATR - Homeless

- o Community-based organizations working with the homeless individual or family will assist the client in calling BPA for a phone screening

Services

Some of the services available in ATR 4:

Treatment Services

- o Intensive Outpatient
- o Outpatient

Recovery Support Services (RSS)

- o Case Management
- o Drug Testing
- o Transportation
- o Life Skills
- o Safe and Sober Housing

**Inpatient Treatment is not covered by ATR 4*

Clients with Other Resources

ATR 4 is not able to provide services for clients eligible to receive similar services through another program

- o Ex. 1 - Clients receiving SUD services through another state funded program
- o Ex. 2 - Clients with Medicaid that are eligible for the Idaho Behavioral Health Plan through Optum

Regulations

HIPAA and 42 CFR Part 2

- o Community-based organization must have a release of information to communicate with the Treatment or RSS provider

Reporting requirements—Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT)



- o Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) required to be completed by Treatment providers at intake, 6 months, and discharge. In addition to meeting reporting requirements, it empowers the client to provide feedback of the program, let the Tx provider know how they are doing with their recovery, and see if additional services are necessary

Projections for Homeless Clients

The average cost per client is projected at \$1,900

On average, ATR 4 clients are expected to receive services for 3-4 months

Year 2	380	\$644,070
Year 3	320	\$629,421
Total	975	\$1,860,932



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
