Welcome, Sign In, and Announcements:

Penny welcomed everyone and asked them to sign in. Penny recognized Commissioner Bilbao from Gem County for attending.

CAPP Facility Presentation:

Angie Norton, Deputy Warden of Programs updated the members on the CAPP facility. Each client leaving CAPP has a release/supervision/aftercare plan and it is faxed to P&P who will work with the providers. There are 90 day and 180 day programs and each client has a detailed file to assist with continuity of care. Angie provided brochures, her business card and extended an invitation for a tour of the facility. Angie also extended an invitation to anyone to provide brochures at the facility that may assist clients with their choices upon release.

Regional Behavioral Health Update:

Todd wanted to extend his appreciation for the RAC/MHB members taking time to attend these meetings as he works closely with a majority of the members on a daily basis and it makes communication and operations much smoother. Todd reported that there has been an increase in complicated cases recently with 18-211 and 18-212's. These are cases where they are not fit to proceed in the judicial system; however, they have a health issue that would preclude them from becoming fit to proceed such as dementia. Accessing resources out in the community will also increase as the need for alternate placement of these difficult cases increases. Todd will also be meeting with the interim District 3 Manager in order to ensure continued communication with 19-2425's. Todd is also working closely with the Canyon County Indigent Fund Director, Michele Chadwick in order to make processes more efficient. Crisis Intervention Training (de-escalation techniques) will be held the week of April 22-26 in Nampa and Caldwell for first responders and law enforcement and registration is currently open.

IDJC Update:

Sharon introduced Joni Ward as her counterpart at IDJC - SUD. Sharon reported that they implemented a locally authorized based system where authorization's for treatment come from probation and managed locally. They recently met with the providers throughout the state to obtain feedback. The providers and probation officers were able to exchange information and ideas between each other to make the system work at a local level within a district. IDJC will be fully implementing WITS after a successful pilot. There are expenditure reports available by county that Sharon will provide to Joy for distribution. They expect to serve 1,500-2,000 juveniles in the new fiscal year. Sharon recognized that District 3 Chief Probation Officers have been very innovative in serving their juvenile populations.

IDOC SUD's Update:

Suzette reported that they are trending slightly over budget. They are currently serving three populations: 19-2524 (% quota per district), Re-entry through CAPP, and Risk to Revoke populations. State statute changed and implementation is scheduled for March 1, 2013. Every PSI will have a GAIN Core by IDOC and Mental Health will review each GAIN Core for services. If IDOC cannot complete the GAIN Core's, they will refer them out to a provider. In order to assist with the financial part, clients will have a co-pay for services. Pregnant women and the military populations are referred out to other funding sources while all others are served under IDOC's benefit matrix. There are more in depth methods occurring to determine where the client falls within the realm of treatment to also determine successful pre-treatment choices. The judiciary system ultimately determines the placement of the individual in services. The provider communication that went out regarding participation of referrals for 19-2524 GAIN Core Assessments has a typo in the email address and should be: idocsud@idoc.idaho.gov

Todd Hurt reported that there is a process in place for Mental Health SUD's referrals and a training will be forthcoming. We should have around 80-100 GAIN Core's per month in Region 3 that will be reviewed and triaged. Those identified as needing more of an assessment will be referred to the region where the full mental health assessment will be conducted and reported back to the court. Others will have a tertiary review and reported back to IDOC. Again, the courts have the last determination.

Suzette wanted to thank CAPP for providing the relapse prevention plan to providers as it helps them to help the client. The use of the plan will be driving the treatment plan.

DHW SUD's Update:

Rosie Andueza, Operations Manager at Central Office introduced herself and explained that the position has changed. Rosie brings a wealth of experience as having worked in multiple DHW Departments. SB1114aa has been passed through the Senate and it's onto the House for review. Some of the changes or amendments were due to initial and ongoing funding. The legislature may not have enough time to complete the review of the bill. They are currently working on an IDAPA Rule change for providers for felons who are working as/for providers. There is a grandfather rule that if you were working as/for a provider on or before May 2010, you could continue care. They are still working on the rule change and would like provider input in forthcoming meetings for feedback on parameters for allowing felons to work in treatment. There was some discussion regarding the rule changes and Rosie encouraged anyone to call or email her to provide input. Rosie reported on the budget and will provide Joy with a copy for distribution. When looking at the total SUD's budget we were trending well, however, when you break down the populations served, we were over budget on some populations. A moratorium (deferred enrollment) has currently been placed on the following populations until the new fiscal year: CP SUD's, CP Drug Court, IVDU, and ATR adult misdemeanants. The BPA contract will be extended through September 30th until the new contract is in place with Optum. Rosie updated the group on the Tool Kit project with 4 components: (1) Two Peer Specialists were hired for implementation, (2) Action Plan Tool Kit – assisting Boards to become formalized, (3) Recovery Tool Kit with Trauma Focus – this has now become a portal for all the information you wanted to know per the needs of the regions, (4) Recovery Coaching – week long training for those interested in assisting in the recovery process or training on the recovery process which

is a billable service under RSS as a Life Skill. Adult Mental Health referrals to SUD's will be managed at the regional level and referred to SUD's providers.

Ryan Phillips reported that the implementation of WITS (Web Infrastructure Treatment System) for SUD's providers is July 1, 2013. There are several upcoming trainings for providers and if you have any questions/comments, you can call or email Ryan Phillips or the WITS Help Desk.

Prevention Update:

Greg Munson was unable to attend, however, sent an email to read to the RAC:

Application Review Board representatives will help Benchmark with application review in each region. The Application Review Board will also review and update the Regional Prevention Strategic Plans. Regional Needs Assessments for SFY 2014 will be available soon - Benchmark is planning on a Needs Assessment release date of March 29, 2013. Be a good idea that you read this if you plan to apply for funds. 2014 Funding Application Process & Timeline - As in the past, we will support the evidence-based programs training & materials, travel for program delivery and the other expenses that it takes to make your programs successful. Please contact Greg Munson if you have questions about particular budget items. All applicants must submit a complete funding application. Funding priority will be given to current contractors in good standing. New applicants and current contractors who received an Out-of-Compliance warning letter in SFY 2013 must compete for the remaining funds.

Joy reiterated how important Prevention services are in the schools and offered to meet with anyone who wanted to know more about Prevention. Prevention works and it's worth your time to apply! Penny also offered her assistance to anyone. She reported that often time's academics are more important to Administrators than taking time out of academics for Prevention, however, if a kiddo is abusing substances; they will not make it academically.

Other Business:

Alan West reported that they are implementing a 6 week class for GAIN I certification at Treasure Valley Community College this summer. Alan will provide the information electronically to Joy for distribution. Penny reported that the Community Coalitions of Idaho (CCI) meeting in Lewiston was interesting. They brought in a speaker to present on how to develop a coalition which was a bit redundant as most members would like more resources on implementing strategies once the coalition is developed which most already are. There was discussion around having the CCI meeting in Boise during the legislative session next year as they would be in more direct contact with them on issues important to the coalitions. Rolland wanted to find out if the coalitions were going to be involved more with the Behavioral Health Boards with the new legislation and expressed some concerns about the Board Membership in the future. Penny reported that yes the coalitions will be heavily involved in the Boards moving

forward and Joy followed up that coalitions support the Recovery Oriented System of Care being implemented. Penny reported that the new Director of IDFY is Greg Sommers and there are a lot of changes happening to the programs. IDFY Youth Summit Camp is still on for June 11-14. Michelle Turner provided information on National Health Corp. Services where clinicians can obtain repayment of their student loans. Enrollment is currently open. Michelle Turner reminded the members that the National Health Service Corp. is currently accepting applications for loan repayment and qualified sites. <http://nhsc.hrsa.gov/>

Welcome, Sign In, and Announcements:

Penny welcomed everyone and asked them to sign in. Penny wanted to thank the RAC for the get well cards that truly lifted her spirits.

Meeting Schedule for 2013 and Presentation Requests:

Penny asked the RAC to suggest presentations for upcoming meetings. Suggestions were Gangs and Treatment, Legislative Session Summary, Children of Incarcerated Parents, Marijuana and Rx Abuse, and Community Coalitions of Idaho (CCI). Penny will be attending the tri-annual CCI meeting in Lewiston the first week of March and will provide an update in March. Penny updated the RAC that she and Brad with Elmore County Medical Center are working on a substance abuse coalition between Owyhee and Elmore counties.

The RAC Region 3 has expressed interest in merging the Boards and thus has been invited to attend the Region 3 Mental Health Board to the March 27, 2013 at 10:00 am meeting to begin the discussions of merging the Boards. Each Board meeting typically lasts about two hours so there has to be some discussion as how it will be modified as not to be a four hour meeting. Joy reinforced the fact that all Board positions are voluntary and she is here to help facilitate the discussion/development of the Regional Behavioral Health Board. Joy reported that there are multiple RAC subcommittees in other regions that report back to the Board and it shortens the length of the overall meetings as well as makes them more “working” Boards. Joy reminded the group that the RAC/MHB 2013 schedule is listed on the MHB and RAC websites, as well distributed electronically.

Regional Behavioral Health Update:

Todd reported that he is preparing his staff and Dept. for the coming changes from the 19-2524's. The AMH/SUD's referral process has not been implemented as of yet, due to the lack of training on how the process will work. Todd requested that any provider updates/brochures/etc. be forwarded onto Joy for use by DHW clinicians in the forthcoming referral process. 18-211's and 18-212's (not fit to proceed) have increased from an average of 2 per year to 8-9 already this year.

IDOC SUD's Update:

Suzette provided expenditure/utilization data and she reported that they are trending slightly over budget and on track to serve more offenders in the FY13. There will be a change in Statute for the 19-2524 potentially March 1 where every client will receive a GAIN Core. Suzette stated that there will also be a co-pay of 5% for clients with the exception of RSS and assessments.

Please communicate with the client's Parole Officer or District Manager if you have concerns about any client. Clients can access 30 days of transitional housing funds and 60 days of SUD housing funds for a total of 90 days. There are a number of changes coming up for IDOC, however, they are focused on a recovery oriented system of care as well. Todd had requested regional numbers – Region 3 IDOC client demographics. During the GAIN Core, clients can be referred for a mental health assessment through each region.

Provider Updates – BPA:

Mike Dickson reported that the ATR misdemeanor probation population has been populated fully. This does not affect any other populations through ATR. GPRA's need to be completed in compliance with ATR Grant requirements. Mike encouraged the providers to pay close attention to their case management, particularly housing needs for their IDOC. WITS is scheduled to launch for all providers in the near future.

Resources and Updates:

There will be a School Resource Meeting on March 4, 2013 from 1-4 pm here at the Dept. Drug Free Idaho will have a series of free presentations over the course of the next 4 weeks and the info is posted to the RAC website. The Idaho Liquor Division will be releasing their mini-grant applications sometime in March. ICADD registration will open up on March 4th and close on April 2nd for early bird registration. ICADD scholarships will be posted to the website for RAC Region 3 members. www.attendicadd.com Joy reminded everyone about the two Toolkits that will be developed/offered over the course of coming months and if anyone wants more information, please contact Rosie.

Proposed Behavioral Health Legislation:

SB1023 submitted by Ross Edmunds, email update: The transformation legislation, formally SB1023, was pulled because input from the court needed to be addressed. It is now going to be reintroduced as new legislation. The Senate H&W committee is not a privileged committee and the time has passed for new legislation to be introduced in none privileged committees. The current plan is that the legislation will be scheduled for a print hearing in Senate Jud & Rules. It will then be scheduled in Senate H&W for hearing if it is sent to print from Jud & Rules.

Other Business:

Michelle Turner reminded the members that the National Health Service Corp. is currently accepting applications for loan repayment and qualified sites. <http://nhsc.hrsa.gov/>

TO: SUD Treatment Provider Network
FROM: SUD Central Office Program Team
RE: Revision of I.C. 19-2524 Statute

Effective March 1, 2013, a GAIN Core evaluation will be conducted presentence on every defendant to meet the requirements of I.C. 19-2524.

IDOC staff will conduct the majority of these assessments, however due to volume or geographic restrictions the district office may make a referral to the SUD provider network.

Once fully implemented, the new process will include DHW staff conducting reviews of each GRRS to determine if they must complete a presentence mental health evaluation. The time requirements to meet each element become more critical which will require a quicker turnaround time for all assessments outsourced to the network. IDOC predicts the network will have approximately 10 business days to submit the GRRS to the district office. IDOC, the Courts and DHW are working together to develop a process to communicate cancellations and no shows to the judiciary.

It is critical that the SUD treatment providers understand and are willing to meet the expectations in this process. A cohesive partnership and process is critical for this to work. Therefore we would like the treatment providers to respond via e-mail if they wish to receive assessment referrals for the 19-2524 population. A non response will result in removing the provider agencies as a referral for presentence 19-2524 assessments.

If you wish to receive 19-2524 assessment authorizations, please submit an e-mail to idoc.sud@idoc.idaho.gov that you are "opting in" to be a part of the assessment network. Place the term "opting in" in the subject line to expedite the e-mail to the appropriate staff member in this process. You may include text in the body of the e-mail to address any details that may be pertinent in this process. Again, those that wish to be excluded in this process will be identified with a non-response. Only those agencies that respond will be identified to receive authorizations.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

RS22035

The intent of this legislation is to make changes to the Behavioral Health System of Care (BHSC) in Idaho. This legislation is the culmination of over a decade of committees that have reviewed Idaho's BHSC and made recommendations. There are a few major themes to recommendations that have been made by the groups during the past decade. First is the integration of the substance use disorder and mental health systems. Second is to allow local communities to have more influence over the BHSC. Third is to clearly articulate the roles of system partners, public agencies, and Branches of Government. Fourth is to create a BHSC that is recovery oriented and consumer driven. In addition to these hallmarks of a transformed system, this legislation also prepares for the overall changes that are coming to behavioral health and health care in general. The BHSC in Idaho and National is moving toward a payer driven system. Insurance companies, including Medicaid, will largely be responsible for clinical treatment services, but not the support services. These services, while typically less expensive, are equally if not more critical to stabilizing individuals with behavioral health disorders.

This legislation will integrate the Regional Advisory Committees (advisory to the substance abuse system) and the Regional Mental Health Boards (advisory to the mental health system) into a single entity. called the Regional Behavioral Health Board (RBHB), which will be responsible for the support services missing under a payer driven system described above. It will expand the State Planning Council on Mental Health to be the State Planning Council on Behavioral Health. This legislation will better describe the role of the State Behavioral Health Authority, DHW's Behavioral Health Division.

FISCAL NOTE

The newly created RBHBs will need funding to assist with startup and ongoing operations. The Department has within its FY2013 budget, \$350,000 (\$50,000 per region) to assist the new created RBHBs with startup costs. These funds are within the Children's Mental Health trustee and benefit appropriation. For ongoing operating funds, the Department has within its personnel and operating budgets in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Divisions' \$420,000 (\$60,000 per region) to assist the RBHBs with base funding for operations. The Department currently receives and administers federal funding for supportive services to individuals with behavioral health disorders that it intends on contracting with the RBHBs to effectively and appropriately administer at the local level. In addition to the funding identified above, the Department will also provide in-kind support to the RBHBs in the form of office space, computer and phone. Finally, the RBHBs will, with this legislation, have the opportunity to seek additional funds from other sources such as grants, contracts with other state and private agencies, and charities to assist them in their efforts to develop and arrange support services for their community members that have behavioral health disorders.

Synopsis

IMPACT: After the Crash

Whose life hasn't in some way-through family or friends or a friend of a friend been touched by the calamity of drunk driving? Our film explores this problem not by waving an accusatory finger at those who drive drunk even though such a gesture might be deserved but instead by taking viewers inside one of the most catastrophic drunk driving episodes in American history; the tragic bus crash in Carrollton, Kentucky, in 1988. But more than that, we take viewers beyond the "impact" to a place of recovery and hope and inspiration.

Our mission with this film is not only to inspire others by providing an in-depth look into the lives of the families of this crash, but also to promote responsibility and proper decision making when it comes to the consumption of alcohol. Please consider supporting us in our mission.

Film Synopsis

The feature documentary, **IMPACT: AFTER THE CRASH**, explores the horrific Carrollton, Kentucky bus crash of May 14, 1988, which killed 27 people (mostly children) and injured nearly three dozen others, making it the worst drunk-driving related accident in U.S. history. The Kentucky tragedy became nationally known, not only because of the devastation it caused, but also because this incident gave prominence to the then-fledgling national anti-drunk driving organization, Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

Our documentary will take viewers back to that fateful night— including a dramatic and powerful recreation of the accident— and then explore how those who lost family and friends have over the years both suffered and recovered from their pain and losses. Bus crash survivor-turned-UK Football Star Harold Dennis provides the emotional center of our documentary, which will also reveal numerous other personal stories of loss and heroic rejuvenation, of fear and love, struggle and hope. The film will offer a stirring and compelling exploration of what it means to try to recover your life, when in an instant, everything is turned upside down.

As the minister who delivered the memorial message to survivors and relatives of those killed in the accident observed, the crash could become not simply a moment of destruction and loss, but a time of deliverance and

new beginnings. For Harold Dennis, among several others, it did. Their courageous response to tragedy is an example to us all. IMPACT: AFTER THE CRASH delivers that powerful message by following the lives of several survivors and kin who suffered deeply from the incident but found the will to begin their lives anew.

Directed by Kentucky's celebrated young filmmaker, Jason Epperson (ON THE LOT, UNREQUITED) and written and produced by Emmy-nominated writer and historian, Daniel Blake Smith (FEBRUARY ONE, KENTUCKY--AN AMERICAN STORY), IMPACT: AFTER THE CRASH tells a moving, universal story about the precariousness of life and the power of change.



Today, February 7, the National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Loan Repayment Program (LRP) opens its 2013 application cycle! The application cycle will be open through April 16, 2013.

To help ensure that the communities with the greatest need are supported, qualified applicants working in Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) with the highest scores as of January 1, 2013, will be given funding preference. With continued service, NHSC providers may be able to pay off all of their student loans.

Initial awards amounts are as follows:

The processing of applications for the 2013 NHSC Loan Repayment Program application cycle will begin after the program closes on April 16, 2013. Applicants should ensure that the application they submit is complete and includes all requested information. A couple new features for 2013 is the ability to withdraw a submitted application prior to the closing date, if changes are necessary and an online Employment Verification for NHSC sites, which must be completed prior to submission.
