H&W Update - Kathy Skippen

The department started the fiscal year without any spend carryover for the first time in many years. This is positive news. The exact processes for new populations are still being worked out.

The RFP for a contract management services is being worked on by IDJC, IDOC and H&W. The RFP for Medicaid Managed Care has been released. Medicaid SUDS will fall under managed care in the future.

There are changes at the Division of Behavioral Health, moving to operational units rather than programs

Ryan Porter is leaving H&W; going to the Supreme Court

Michael Bartlett is moving to a position in the BH policy unit.

Terry Pappin is also moving to a position in the BH policy unit working with block grants. Kathy Skippen is moving to a program specialist position and recovery support part of work focus. Kathy shared a brief history of SUDS evolution over the past decade or so, from the county, state and department experience she has had.

There will be two new positions in the future; one for the ATR grant and another for contract management.

IDJC Update - Sharon Burke

Sharon provided a summary of the end of FY 12; 50% of the appropriation was spent, but should be noted that ½ of assessments occurred in the final quarter of the year. For FY13 IDJC has spent 13% of budget with 17% of year elapsed.

WITS is being implemented in IDJC systems. Sharon complimented the WITS team for help in the internal implementation of WITS for tracking. Rollout of additional modules will be happening; billing and adjudication modules in the future.

IDOC - Suzette Driscoll

Specific budget information is not yet available for this FY, however, Suzette noted that spend rate is slightly above the budget amount for the first quarter.

IDOC has been working with BPA on CSRs and Transfers. They are also working with BPA on change orders and more operational transitions that will reduce turnaround times.

Recovery support services are an area that is being reviewed. Housing is maximized. The clinical and DARS staff is participating in a 2-day training. IDOC is working with the district offices to lessen the law enforcement approach and improve supervision to maintain the clients in the community while maintaining community safety. IDOC has a target of date of early October for the electronic consent module in a WITS pilot.

A brief recess was taken and the full RAC reconvened at 10:15 am.

Vern Garrett chaired the meeting in the absence of Darren Richman. The agenda and minutes from the May 9, 2012 meeting were approved.

Laura provided a brief update on regional projects. Region 3 and Region4 CRDSs and an individual from Bruneau have met with community members in Mtn Home to present the idea of creating coalition that would encompass these parts of the both regions. The Community Coalitions of Idaho are meeting in Idaho Falls in October. Laura requested the RAC support hotel costs for a person from Mtn Home to attend that meeting (if someone can attend); consensus was to support efforts with \$200 for travel expenses. Laura will follow up with Mtn Home group. She will also try to connect the Mtn Home group with other local coalitions that may be driving to Idaho Falls to help with transportation needs.

High in Plain Sight is a training that DrugFree Idaho is partnering with Region 4 to provide on October 3, 2012 from 2 to 4 pm. Laura has secured video conference sites in all 7 H&W regions, so the training that originates at the Westgate office will be available state wide. Focus is on the trends in substance use, abuse and cultural references to drugs, including logos, clothing. Target audience is professionals that may be involved with home visits, such as child protection and mental health staff, in addition to probation/parole for adults and juveniles. Registration is free and is at www.drugfreeidaho.org

Laura will pursue having the teens that attended IDFY's camp in June send a short video report for the November RAC meeting, if attending in person is not possible.

Laura also reminded everyone of the IDAPA rules public hearing on Thursday, September 13, from 3 to 5 pm; video conference location is room 142 at the Westgate offices.

Ada County Sheriff's Office – Chris Saunders

ACSO was awarded the Transition from Jail to Community Grant from the National Institute of Corrections and the Urban Institute. It is a 30 month process to further refine and expand our reentry effort for offenders. The model incorporates the need for system level change within the criminal justice system along with enhancing and growing collaborative partnerships with community providers. Over the next few months, we will be forming various re-entry working group subcommittees to address the biggest areas of need for our offender population.

RAC members were reminded of the Resource Fair on September 19; at 1 pm an overview of the grant ACSO received will be covered.

Recovery Update - Melanie Curtis

Melanie reminded anyone interested in the formation of a statewide group focused on recovery in Idaho to join in a call on Tuesday September 25, 2012 from 2 to 3 pm mtn time. Prevention Contracts - Greg Munson

Greg reported that nearly all of Region 4 is contracted for prevention services in every county; contracts are still being finalized. A new program will be offered at Morley Nelson Elementary school in the Boise school district. The focus of the program is children of incarcerated parents. They will be running three different groups over the year; BSU will be working on a study of the pilot data.

Networking Updates

Marianne King from DrugFree Idaho reminded everyone that their Prescription Drug Abuse Prevention grant includes a Twitter Party on September 13 – so join in online or tweet a question. #RxDrugAbuse is the hashtag. The Prescription Drug take back event is September 29 – with 5 locations in the Treasure Valley.

Chris Christopher from Pioneer Health reminded everyone to attend their open house for their new Garden City location; 5583 North Glenwood, on Thursday September 13, from 11 to 2 pm.

Gina Westcott, region 4 Behavioral Health program manager reported that staff has been busy. There have been a high number of mental holds in July and August. Also the region 3 and 4 Mental Health Boards are meeting jointing on September 26 at the Region 3 offices (Franklin Road, exit 29). All are invited to attend.

Dottie Blackmon from RADAR provided information and resources on the no texting while driving campaign, Just Put it Down.

Melanie Curtis from SHIP and Connect the Pieces, reported that plans are underway for 'sticker blast' in November, working with pharmacies in Canyon and Ada counties – a sticker on bags to remind people to keep their medications locked up and disposed of properly.

Sandy Jones, Ada County Sherriff's Office Misdemeanant Probation reported they will begin services on October 1 and preparations are in the final stages.

#### JUVENILE JUSTICE SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER SERVICES FISCAL YEAR 2012 RECAP

The strength of juvenile justice partnerships was evident in the past year as we implemented the new Juvenile Justice Substance Use Disorder Services Delivery System. The counties, judiciary and agency partners as well as the private providers worked with IDJC to create a locally managed treatment system for justice involved juveniles while maintaining fiscal accountability and support at the state level.


- \* Served 907 juveniles with 49% of the \$4.0 million appropriation
- \*in comparison to the prior year when 1,146 juveniles were served with \$3.2 million, the new system served more of the juveniles in a loss costly outpatient setting
- \*Due to building of the new system, over half of the assessments in FY 2012 were conducted in the last quarter; these juveniles' treatment costs will largely be incurred in FY13
- \*The level of funding required to serve this population will be established in the coming year

#### Accomplishments in the first year of operations:

- > District Teams came together to establish local referral, assessment and management processes.
- ▶ IDJC developed a system to manage clients in treatment and provide accountability for expenditures.
- > The caseload from the prior year was reviewed and inactive clients were closed.
- > Probation became the point of referral and oversight for the episode to ensure engagement in treatment and referrals began to grow.
- > Abbie Campbell joined as Program Specialist to lead the WITS implementation and support county partnerships.

#### Focus of efforts in coming years:

- Continuing to expand availability and access to adolescent-focused treatment statewide will be critical to the success of the program.
- Additional focus on connecting IDJC institutional treatment expertise with the community-based system will enhance services for juveniles reintegrating from custody as well as probationers.



- > IDJC is implementing the WITS Electronic Treatment System for internal client management and participating in 2 pilot projects with full implementation planned by July 1, 2013.
- > IDJC will participate with agency partners and the judiciary to develop a new RFP for the contract to manage the substance use disorder services provider network.
- > Coordination with BSU for a full system evaluation will report full information on services provided and outcomes achieved and will help to guide development of the system in the future.

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
